TRIAL DECORUM AND MEDIA ORDER

The purpose of this order is to protect the parties' constitutional rights to a fair and impartial trial; to allow the public and the media to exercise their First Amendment rights; to ensure courtroom proceedings are conducted with respect and decorum for the proper administration of justice, and to ensure the safe, orderly use of court facilities. The Court may rescind or modify this order at any time based on specific circumstances or in the Court's discretion.

Security

The Monterey County Sheriff's Department is responsible for security in the Monterey County Superior Court. Failure to adhere to the rules in this order or to abide by orders of the Sheriff's Department may result in sanctions including expulsion from the courtroom and/or courthouse, and any other lawful response.

Photography, Video, Audio & Electronic Devices in the Courtroom

Recording of courtroom proceedings is restricted. One pool camera for still photography is allowed. Media organizations are to cooperate to select the individual(s) who will be operating the pool camera and identify them to Norma.Ramirez-Zapata@monterey.courts.ca.gov and dl-adm-

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media@monterey.courts.ca.gov no later than Thursday June 2nd at 12 noon. The pool camera is not to capture images of spectators or jurors. The pool camera is prohibited from capturing images of proceedings held in chambers; proceedings closed to the public; jury selection; conferences between an attorney and a client, witness or aide; conferences between attorneys; and conferences between counsel and the judge at the bench, as proscribed by California Rule of Court 1.150(e)(6). No other cameras are allowed. No audio recording is allowed inside the courtroom. This includes audio recordings for note taking purposes.

Cell phones, smart phones, smart watches, laptops, tablets and all other electronic devices must be turned off while in the courtroom. The use of electronic devices is prohibited inside the court. This provision does not apply to the litigants and their designated agents.

Media Credentials

Due to limited courtroom seating in Department 4, court-issued credentials will be issued according to the Court's protocol and discretion. A court-issued credential is required to be admitted for limited courtroom seating. There will be no exceptions to this requirement. Media outlets requesting a court credential must submit a request to Norma Ramirez-Zapata at Norma. Ramirez-

Zapata@monterey.courts.ca.gov no later than Thursday June 2nd, 2022 at 12 noon.

Media personnel must be prepared to present official credentials identifying them as a member of a recognized media organization. Court-issued credentials shall be valid for entry into Department 4 during the trial unless they are rescinded by court order. If seat demand in Department 4 exceeds the available capacity for a specific phase of the trial, there will be only one assigned seat per media outlet or parent company. Due to the limited number of seats in Department 4, the Court has arranged for overflow seating in a designated area of the courthouse. The proceedings will be broadcast live in the designated overflow seating area.

Media credentials and court-issued credentials must be worn visibly at all times inside the courthouse. Court-issued credentials cannot be transferred to other media personnel. Loaning to another media representative a Court-issued credential that does not belong to them or their parent organization will result in the loss of the media credential and its privileges for the duration of the trial.

No media interviews whatsoever will be permitted in the courtroom at any time.

Courtroom Seating

Audience seating in Department 4 is limited. There will be designated seating for families, court-credentialed media, and the public as deemed necessary by the Court. For those members of the public who wish to attend in-person, permission is required from the Court to occupy the public seats. If demand for the seats in Department 4 exceeds capacity, the Court retains the sole discretion to conduct seating lotteries or implement some other means of allocating available seating, including on a first come, first seated basis, depending on the trial phase.

All Court-credentialed media personnel and members of the public must check in every morning with the Public and Media Relations table. The public and media personnel must take their seats at least 5 minutes before the start of any court session and must remain in the courtroom (except for emergencies) until the next recess is called. No spectators will routinely be admitted or allowed to depart the courtroom while court is in session. Failure to abide by this time restriction may result in loss of assigned or lottery seating that day as determined by the Court's staff.

Due to the limited seating capacity of Department 4, only members of the prospective jury panel will be admitted to the spectator section of Department 4 while the prospective jurors complete juror questionnaires and during individual juror voir dire.

During the trial, a portion of the spectator section of the courtroom will be reserved for the media in accordance with a predetermined seating plan. The public will be admitted to the media portion of the courtroom only if seating remains available after all media representatives have been seated. Media representatives may be admitted to the public portion of the courtroom only if seating remains available after all members of the public have been seated.

The media and the public are reminded that any attempt by anyone, without leave of the court, to communicate with a member of the jury panel respecting the case prior to selection of a jury, other than in the course of voir dire, and any attempt by anyone, without leave of Court, to communicate with a member of the jury once selected respecting the case, other than in the course of trial, until the conclusion of the case, may be punished as a criminal contempt of court.

Outside the Courtroom

Video and still photography as well as audio recording and broadcasting are prohibited in any public area of the courthouse. No disruptions in the hallway will be tolerated. The noise level in the hallway must be kept to a minimum. Other courtrooms will also be in session. No passageways or doors may be blocked.

Violations of this Order

Anyone violating this order will be subject to the discipline of the Court, including but not limited to, the Court's contempt authority, immediate removal from the courtroom, prohibition from returning to the courtroom and revocation of the court-issued media credential. Photographs and video or audio recordings made in violation of this order will be subject to equipment confiscation and erasure of the prohibited content. Violators of this order may be excluded from the courtroom for the duration of the trial.
